
THE VITAL ROLE OF FIRE SAFETY

Fire Extinguisher Safety


Fire extinguishers are safe devices when they are used correctly. Practice these steps to ensure fire extinguisher safety.



Mount extinguishers out of reach of small children and pets.




If a fire is large or out of control, exit immediately and call 911. Don't try to use a fire extinguisher.



Always use a fire extinguisher with your back to the exit, in case you need to evacuate.



Never point an extinguisher near people or pets to prevent skin, eye, and lung irritation.



Air out any area where an extinguisher is used before re-entering.
